Dr. G. G. Kilpatrick Speaks at Annual Banquet; MAR Baviers Besides

Understanding among nations nd universal tolerance were named imperative to world-wide friendship by Dr. G. G. D. Kilpatrick, D.S.O., principal, United Theological College, Montreal, in an address to the 46th anniversary dinner of St. David's Society of Montreal in the Ritz-Carlton Hotel last pight last night,

George Davies, president, was chairman during an evening of celebration that featured toasts to St. David by prominent members of Montreal's Welsh community, choral offerings by the Montreal Welsh Choir and dancing.

Friendship was the foundation of modern society, Dr. Kilpatrick stressed, and he felt that not enough attention was paid what he

enough attention was paid what he termed "the tissues of human society."

Real problem of nations today was that they did not know how to "walk together". Dr. Kilpatrick maintained.

"The art of living together has to be studied and learned. It entails discipline, tolerance and selfsacrifice."

Dr. Kilpatrick contended that until a treaty representative of the minds and mentalities of all peoples was created, no other type of treaty could succeed.

Tolerance by all toward all would lessen much of the world's bitter-ness, Dr. Kilpatrick contended but he stressed that tolerance must be practiced before its benefits could

be enjoyed.
